Akita owners should also be aware of the high incidence of Gastric dilatation volvulus (GDV) in the breed when training Akita dogs.

Aggressive Dog Training for Akita

Puppy socialization classes should be enough to stop dog aggression during Akita Training. American Akita training experts say that the best way to stop dog aggression is to start socializing your dog as soon as possible and to continue that process throughout their lives. If not properly socialized, Akita can demonstrate aggression directed at dogs, young children, and even sometimes adults, (specifically strangers) Your Akita obedience training program should focus on how to stop aggressive dog. It is also really important that your dog realizes that YOU are the boss, not them. Because dogs are pack animals, they are constantly attempting to judge their place in the hierarchy of the pack, (in this case, your home). The best way to stop dog aggression during Akita obedience training is to make it very clear that you are top dog, not them.

Akita Puppy Training and Potty Training Tips

The time spent with puppy house training is crucial to the success of your overall Akita puppy training curriculum. Proper Akita training should include a tour of the house and yard - anywhere they ARE allowed to be. And if they try to go into rooms / places you do not want them, just say "No" and take them back to somewhere that IS ok. Next, bring your pup to the place you would like them to go potty. Say your cue word, (for example "potty" or "bathroom"). If they do not go the first few times, don't worry. House training a puppy requires persistence and patience. Puppy accidents are bound to happen, but don't rub their face in "it". Rubbing their face in "it" or spanking your dog can make them scared of you and other people. You may need a puppy sitter for the first month or so to make sure that there is always someone around to let your Akita puppy out to go potty.
